Do you want to learn how to safely can, dry or freeze your garden's

bounty? University of Idaho Extension invites you to enroll in Preserve@Home, an in-depth, online food preservation class to teach individuals how to safely preserve a variety of foods. Participants learn how to produce high-quality, preserved foods and the science behind food preservation and food safety.

The registration deadline is Tuesday, **June 6**, **2022**. The first lesson of the 6-week course opens online on **Thursday, June 9 at 1 pm MT**. Each lesson includes online text (that can be downloaded and printed), online bulletin board to facilitate participant discussion, and a real-time weekly chat to interact with classmates and instructors. The weekly online chat session for the first lesson will be on **Thursday, June 16** from 1:00 to 1:45 p.m. MT. Topics to be covered include: Foodborne Illness – causes and prevention, Spoilage and Canning Basics, Canning High Acid foods, Canning Specialty High Acid Foods – pickles, salsa, jams, jellies, etc., Canning Low Acid Foods, and Freezing and Drying. Supplemental materials will include materials on planting varieties for food preservation, cold storage and root cellaring.

The cost is \$35 plus the cost of supplemental materials. Many of the supplemental materials are available free, online, but paper copies may be purchased from University of Idaho Extension Publications <u>https://www.uidaho.edu/extension/publications</u>. Weed Aware: Community Spray Days

By now you should have received a post card from the Lemhi Cooperative Weed Management Area (CWMA) advertising the community spray days. Spray days are designed for local property owners and managers to have assistance in identifying noxious weeds on their property, receive control recommendations, and the appropriate herbicide for their noxious weeds at their location. The CWMA offers seven spray days each and locations can change from year to year. Locations are determined by participation from previous years. Spray days are from 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. They are weather dependent and if one is cancelled, it WILL NOT be rescheduled.

If you are considering participating in a community spray day, here is how they work. To start, make sure your spray equipment is in working order. Put some water through it to make sure there is no residue from the last spray, the pump is working, the seals are good, the plugs are in and the nozzle is not plugged. Please wear spray appropriate clothing that includes long sleeve shirt, long plants and closed toes shoes with socks. The CWMA and its partners will set up a staging area that will be designated by signs so people can find it. You come to the area with your herbicide application equipment. If you don't have equipment, you can check out a backpack sprayer or ATV sprayer for free to utilize for the day. When you arrive, you will check in and locate on a map your property where you will be applying herbicide. Next, you will need to tell what noxious weeds you will be controlling. You can only receive herbicide to control weeds listed on Idaho's noxious weed list. If you are not sure what those weeds are, you can go to: https://invasivespecies.idaho.gov/plants to see the list. If you haven't identified the noxious weeds on your property, bring samples with you including the root system. Someone there can help you identify them. The reason this is important is that not all herbicides work on all noxious weeds. Once we know where the weeds are, what the weeds are, and how many acres, then a committee member will place the correct herbicide, dye and surfactant in your herbicide application equipment. Once home, you will add water and apply to the noxious weeds. Once the herbicide has had dye and surfactant added, the shelf life is 12 hours and yes, we must add the dye and surfactant. You may come more than once and have your equipment re-filled. You will be limited to the amount of herbicide by the amount of property under your care. For example if you own 5 acres and feel that 50% of the property is covered by noxious weeds, then you will be limited to enough herbicide for 37.5 gallons of solution at 15 gallons of solution to the acre.

Practice bio-security to help protect your flock from avian influenza

Avian influenza, aka bird flu, is a respiratory disease found in birds, both domestic and wild. It has been identified in Eastern Idaho in the past couple of weeks, hence the reason for this article. Bird flu is spread quickly by direct bird to bird contact. It can also spread indirectly when birds come in contact with a contaminated surfaces or materials. Wild birds such as ducks, gulls, and shorebirds do not always show signs of illness, but may be caring the virus. The virus can be moved in manure; on egg flats, crates, farming equipment and by people.

So, what should you do? Develop and write a biosecurity plan for your flock. Keep the virus germs away by disinfecting equipment and not sharing equipment with another flock. Wash your hands and boots before and after entering a poultry area. Purchase birds from reputable sources so you know they are healthy. Limit visitors to your chicken coop. Consider putting a cover on your chicken yard to prevent wild birds from visiting. Consider securing your feed bins and waters to prevent wildlife contamination.

If you think you may have had bird flu in your flock, contact your veterinarian! They can help you determine if indeed your flock has bird flu. They will also help you with the plan to keep it from spreading to other flocks.

Citizens against weeds: 50/50 Cost Share Program

The Lemhi CWMA is all about helping people control noxious weeds on their property! The 50/50 cost share program is for those property owners and managers who cannot utilize the community spray days or have more property than they can spray. With this program, a landowner or manager can hire a professional to spray the noxious weeds on their property. After submitting the following documents to the Lemhi County Weed Office, you could receive a 50% refund. This includes both labor and herbicide costs.

- Show proof of payment and invoice
- Map (Google Earth or similar no drawings) of area worked on
- Spray record showing what was sprayed (weeds and chemical)

Property must be in Cost Share area: Lemhi River Drainage, Carmen Drainage, Pahsimeroi Valley, and down river. You are highly encouraged to call the Lemhi County Weed office at 208-742-1661 to make sure your prope rty qualifies.
